**CHANGES** to concessionary bus passes From 1 April 2011, responsibility for the Concessionary Travel Pass (Bus Pass) for older people and people with disabilities, will pass to Transport for Buckinghamshire.

The scheme allows residents who are registered disabled or are of pensionable age, free travel on buses from 9.30am (9am in Buckinghamshire only) Monday to Friday, weekends and bank holidays. All enquiries regarding new passes and new applications will be referred to the County Council from 6 March 2011. Residents applying for their first pass can download an application form on-line at [www.buckscc.gov.uk/transport](http://www.buckscc.gov.uk/transport) or telephone 0845 5212521 to request a form.

Existing holders whose concessionary bus passes are due to expire between 31 March and 30 June 2011, will receive a renewal form in the post from their District Council. Passes for those who have already returned this form to their District Council, will be sent out by 1 April 2011. Any queries regarding your renewal form should be addressed to your

District Council. Buckinghamshire County Council will be responsible for all bus pass renewals, from July 2011 onwards.

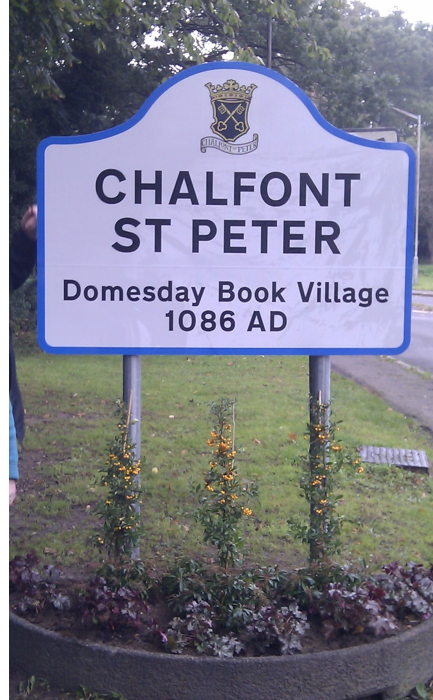

### **STREET PARTIES FOR THE ROYAL WEDDING**

The wedding of Prince William to Miss Catherine Middleton on Friday, April 29, 2011 gives everyone a great opportunity to celebrate with a wide range of events, including traditional street parties.

In order to make it easy for residents to hold street parties on the public highway Transport for Buckinghamshire, in conjunction with the District Councils has raised the



necessary temporary traffic regulation orders allowing the closure of almost any unclassified road to allow street parties to go ahead. There are just a few roads where closures cannot be permitted and these include bus routes and rural access roads.

Application forms and the associated guidance notes are available on all council websites in Buckinghamshire (see links below). The completed forms should be returned to the relevant district council.

If you are planning a party, Transport for Buckinghamshire recommend that you check that your event doesn't clash with other events in your area as two or more events held at the same time in a local area could cause traffic problems. We realise that communities may not be able to arrange their party on the actual day of the Wedding, therefore, we will also consider applications for parties to take place on one of the following dates: April 29 and 30, 2011, May 1 and 2, 2011

Valerie Letheren, Buckinghamshire County Council Cabinet Member for Transport, said "Usually Councils do not encourage events on the public highway, but the Royal Wedding is a fantastic opportunity to get together in local communities and celebrate this very special national occasion. Safety is our prime concern but we will do our very best to advise you so that your party can go ahead.

**COFFEE** Morning in aid of The Leprosy Mission at Gerrards Cross Methodist Church Hall Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> April 2011 from 10 am – 12 (noon). *Bring & Buy Stall* Come - Bring your friends and neighbours We need your help!

On average it costs The Leprosy Mission just £20 to cure someone of leprosy. This covers a doctor's diagnosis, meetings with a physiotherapist to test for nerve damage and plan treatment (re constructive surgery/physiotherapy/disability aids, etc) and counselling. It also includes following up those who have stopped coming to collect their medicines, to ensure they finish their course of treatment. In other cases it pays for outreach programmes for health professionals to visit and test in remote communities at a high risk from leprosy.

The crucial factor in providing all this at such a low cost is that the cure for leprosy, multi drug therapy (MDT), has been provided free since 2000 by Novartis, a Swiss-based pharmaceutical company. Last October Novartis signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the World Health Organisation (WHO) to continue providing MDT until the end of 2015 – this is a real point of praise.

Without Novartis's commitment, organisations like The Leprosy Mission would have huge additional costs. Patients treated through public health centres might also have to pay for the drugs or go without

Readers may be surprised to know there are cases of leprosy in the UK too. About 12-15 people are diagnosed at the London Hospital for Tropical Diseases each year. All have contracted the disease overseas. Fortunately, leprosy is not highly contagious and is easily curable.

Perhaps more surprisingly, in England and Wales we still have legislation which could be used to isolate people affected by leprosy or deny children access to school, even though this is not carried out in practice.

Throughout the world, a person is diagnosed with leprosy every two minutes.

## **DEALING WITH SPEEDING TRAFFIC Community Concern' Scheme**

Thames Valley Police are responsible for all matters concerning enforcement of traffic laws. The Thames Valley Safer Roads Partnership is currently running a Community Concern scheme where requests from the public about speeding are considered for enforcement, either by Police presence/speed checks or mobile camera enforcement through a "dealing with speeding traffic" scheme.

Neighbourhood Policing deal with reported speeding in various ways, depending on the nature of the problem (i.e. the number of speeding motorists and the number/type of collisions on the road length).

## **Make the Commitment (MTC)**

If the majority of users are local residents it may be the case that our 'Make the Commitment' scheme is suitable. The scheme asks drivers to sign a pledge that they will try to keep to the speed limits at all times. The idea behind this is that it will focus a driver's attention on the speed at which they travel and help them maintain a lower speed. This initiative is most effective when the majority of users are local residents who travel the road regularly and therefore if leaflets regarding this scheme could be distributed within the local area alongside further publicity on concerns it could help to reduce the speed of the majority of the road's users. **FEAST** Day shaping up nicely This years major event in Chalfont St Peter will take place on Saturday 25th June on Gold Hill Common. The organisers have pulled out all the stops to build on the last two year's fantastic events with a superb line up of activities and entertainment.

During the day, some one hundred stalls will be operating and a full programme will be taking place on the stage and in the arena. Local schools will be presenting gymnastics and dancing displays and there will be performances by David Meacock, Trapdoor Drama, Urban Pulse, Gerrards Cross Rock Choir and others. The main feature of the day's activities will be series of medieval re-enactments by Black Knight Historical including dance and music, archery and a fighting display.

Vintage cars, Punch and Judy and a funfair will also all be present. Top Rolling Stones tribute band, The Rollin Stoned, will headline the evening concert. In addition, top Thin Lizzy tribute band Pheel Lizzy will be supporting.

Sponsorship and advertising packages are still available, as are stalls. Around 60% of pitches have currently been sold for what will, undoubtedly be the local event of the year. Around 6,000 people attended in 2010 and, given similar good weather, the organisers are hoping for at least a similar number this time. Whilst the entire day's activities are free to attend, it is hoped that visitors will be generous in donating money and local charities will benefit from profits made.

## **BUCKS LAUNCHES ITS BIG SOCIETY BANK**

Voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations in Buckinghamshire will get a major boost to their funds with the launch of Bucks Big Society Bank. Buckinghamshire County Council is the founding contributor to the new bank, providing a contribution of £75,000.

The Bucks Big Society Bank will be administered by Buckinghamshire Community Foundation, and the idea has been developed in partnership with Community Impact Bucks and The Clare Foundation.

The bank will provide a low-cost loan fund for smaller voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations in all parts of the county. Its aim is to help these organisations achieve their objectives by providing loans to enable them to access other sources of income, including grants, private

donations, lottery funding and trading income, which will help them continue to build and develop their capacity to meet the vital needs of local communities.

Organisations eligible to apply for funding from the bank need to be situated in Buckinghamshire and be providing services or support, just for local residents. The loans, starting from just £1,000 to £25,000, may be used for a variety of purposes, equipment and premises costs. They could also be used as a bridging loan pending receipt of other funds due, or to allow the organisation time to change its business model.

As well as showing ability to repay the loan over a term of up to five years, loan applicants will need to show broad community support and public benefit, either directly through the services provided or indirectly through the generation of income to support activities for wide public benefit.

Bill Chapple, Deputy Leader of Buckinghamshire County Council, said: "We're proud to be a founding contributor to the new Bucks Big Society Bank. The county has a thriving voluntary, community and social enterprise sector, with almost 4,000 organisations carrying out vital work. The launch of this bank recognises the vital role that the sector plays in running local community services and is part of what Big Society is about in Buckinghamshire."

Richard Dickson, Director of Buckinghamshire Community Foundation, said: "A low-cost loan from Bucks Big Society Bank - as part of a mix of different funding streams including grants - may help some groups and social enterprises to become more self-reliant. The success of Bucks Big Society Bank will also depend upon the extent to which other local individuals, businesses and trusts get behind the idea and also contribute towards the bank's funds."

**NEW** habitat mapping to ensure conservation is a priority in planning, development and countryside care across Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes has been launched.

The Habitat Mapping Project, set up by Buckinghamshire County Council, Buckinghamshire & Milton Keynes Environmental Record Centre, and Milton Keynes Council, charts and records for the first time in one place a detailed analysis of protected habitats across the area.

It's the result of six years research by Buckinghamshire County Council's Natural Environment Team. Already, the information is helping the county council assess the impact of the proposed High Speed 2 rail on Buckinghamshire, to support the current national consultation on the route.

The habitat mapping database provides information not only for council planning and transport officers, land managers, and commercial developers, but also for environmental interest groups, schools, colleges and universities, and academic researchers.

It shows the locations of more than 65,000 habitats, how sites are managed, and acts as a trigger for further ecological investigations which planning regulations may require. It has drawn on sightings, records and data generated by more than 30 organisations around the county, dating back 20 years.

The map will be updated annually from information and sightings by local conservation groups, and data from national organisations.

All sites are open seven days a week, except on 25 December, 26 December and 1 January.

**A PARTNERSHIP** between Buckinghamshire County Council and Community Impact Bucks (CIB) is helping volunteers to set up and co-ordinate car schemes for their neighbourhoods.

CIB, an independent charity that helps people to get involved in community activity, is working with the county council's Local Area Forums (LAF) to support interested groups with mentoring, advice and a tool kit for setting up a transport project.

Rural residents' transport needs cannot always be met by a one-size-fits-all solution like a bus, which runs only at certain times, and requires a minimum number of passengers to give best value, says county council Passenger Transport Contracts Manager Andy Clarke. 'Often people need to get to the doctor or the library, and a community car or bus scheme is a much more effective solution because it's more flexible and more closely matches their needs,' he said.

Last July Princes Risborough launched a community bus

service, with county council support, after the need was identified through a community appraisal. The county council's North West Chiltern Local Area Forum contributed £1,500. Thirty volunteers take turns to drive the bus, which carries more than 200 passengers a week.

The birth of another community transport project looks likely at Chesham where a car scheme has been running for 30 years, taking people to doctors' and hospital appointments. Next week residents are getting together with CIB to discuss the possibility of a new car scheme to serve social needs, like shopping, picking up prescriptions and visiting friends.

Sally Hussey, CIB's Rural Transport Partnership Officer, who is working with LAFs across the county to equip local volunteers to run their own schemes, said: 'It's often issues like insurance and CRB checks that volunteers need help with - and that's part of our tool kit to help them set up a needs-led service.'

Bill Chapple, Buckinghamshire County Council's Deputy Leader and Champion for Big Society, said: 'Transport needs change over time and a solution that was right 20

years ago may not be the right one for today. Volunteer car and bus schemes recognise residents' needs for flexibility, and their desire to find Big Society solutions to their community transport needs. This is a local need being met by a local solution.'

Anyone interested in the history of Buckinghamshire can also order and pay on-line for copies of certificates, which date as far back to the year 1837.

Cabinet Member for Adults and Families, Patricia Birchley, said: "This new system allows residents to book their appointment at a time convenient to them as we understand that many people are at work or busy during the time the office is open. The booking system is quick and easy and will enhance the current service delivered through our Register Office."
