**HERE'S** a bright idea... leave a light on! As evening descends ever earlier, Chiltern residents are being advised to use timer light switches, to deter burglars who take advantage of darkness.

Chiltern Community Safety Partnership is working on an initiative which targets residents who get home after dark in the winter months, such as commuters and late night shoppers.

Residents are being asked to consider using their timer light switch to leave a light on if they plan to return home after dark. Other advice is to regularly vary the times they set timer switches to turn on and off. Burglary awareness events take place through to the beginning of January. Staff from Thames Valley Police and Chiltern District Council Community Safety Team will be at locations across the district, such as train stations and supermarkets, handing out timer light switches and providing information about how to secure homes effectively against burglaries. British Transport Police will also be helping out at some of the events.

Deterring burglars does not have to cost you a fortune as you can use your timer light switch with an energy saving light bulb. You can purchase timer light switches and energy saving light bulbs from most large supermarkets and DIY stores.

It tracks your bus journey and will tell you exactly when your bus is due to depart from your stop. This can be used anywhere via your mobile phone or pc so you can stay warm and dry as long as possible and less time at the bus stop.

Peter Hardy, Buckinghamshire's Cabinet Member for Planning and Transport, said: "As well as providing live information to passengers, nextBus also helps us monitor punctuality so we can work with bus companies to improve reliability, making catching the bus a smarter way to travel."

You can access nextBus in a number of ways:

**CHALFONT** St Peter Parish Council legally challenges Chiltern District Council's Core Strategy document

Over the last three years, Chalfont St Peter Parish Council have made great diplomatic efforts to try to engage Chiltern District Council to work with the village so that the planned developments that are being imposed upon us may take a more sensitive and conducive form. Sense4csp have also been active in trying to persuade CDC to work with the residents to consider our wishes. Sadly our combined efforts have come to nothing although we are very encouraged that Chiltern District council now has new planning officers who seem much more open to the kinds of ideas that the village has been proposing. However decisions made by the old planning department are still rolling forward and The Parish Council have already had to issue the Judicial review challenge to CDC for their decision to approve the Holy Cross/Gerald Eve planning approval which ignored the existing educational and community use of the site.

On the 15th of November 2011 CDC also ratified their Core Strategy after it was approved by the Government planning Inspector. Both CDC and The Planning Inspector have ignored an alternative development option for the site which would entail moving the Chalfont St Peter Church Of England Academy School and developing the old school site as envisaged in the Arrowcroft plan.

The failure to properly consider this alternative planning option, which was suggested very early on by the Parish Council in 2009, means that the Core Strategy is in breach of planning directives. The Parish Council has had no option but to challenge the approval of the Core Strategy by the Inspector in the High Court.

The Parish Council along with their planning and legal advisers have done an excellent job building the case and highlighting the many legal issues therein. We expect the hearing to take place in Spring 2012.

SENSE along with the Parish Council sincerely hope that the landowner and CDC can see the value of the Arrowcroft proposal or a similar plan should it come forward. The Arrowcroft proposal not only provides new houses but also allows the Academy School to have a better site with playing fields and community sports facilities. It also provides the village with a much better mixed development that will enhance Chalfont St Peter for the future in contrast to the dense unimaginative plan that has already been passed which addresses none of the villages existing problems.

## **BUDGET** proposals pave the way for better roads

Well maintained roads are not just good news for motorists, they help stimulate the local economy and highway improvements have been identified as a top priority by both the public and Buckinghamshire county councillors.

This year, a £25 million two-year investment programme was agreed by the County Council and work started on more than 250 major resurfacing schemes in mid-July. The improvements to Buckinghamshire's roads soon became visible, with highly favourable feedback from the public. [See attachment]

Investment will need to continue over several years, to fully tackle the maintenance backlog. And at the (December) Cabinet, members considering draft budget proposals agreed to add another £5 million to the capital programme to continue the work, bringing the total funding over two years to £30 million.

Over the two-year lifetime of the scheme, the County's 57 Members can each choose five sites in their wards for highway improvements, and are listening to where their electorate want priorities made.

These proposals will now go out for further public consultation, be reviewed by the Overview and Scrutiny Committee before a final budget is agreed by full Council on 16 February 2012.

Martin Tett, Leader of Buckinghamshire County Council, said: "We are a customer-focused authority. The public have told us time after time they want decent roads. Spending money on improving our roads will help boost local businesses and make Buckinghamshire an even more attractive option to visitors and new businesses.

"We have reserves set aside just for these times, and it makes sense to draw on these funds to start getting our highway network up to standard and to help the local economy during these straitened times. However, this is only the beginning of a long programme that will be necessary to truly make our roads meet residents' legitimate expectations."

Peter Hardy, Cabinet Member for Transport said: "The 'We're Working on It' project has been a huge success and communities all over the county have benefited from the improvements. We've received really positive feedback from the public, so the extra funding for the coming financial year is really good news."

**IT'S** official - it's safe to park in Chiltern. All 19 of our car parks have been awarded the Park Mark award. Each was reassessed during November and found to meet the high standards required by the Safer Parking Scheme. Safer Parking Scheme development manager, Ian Carmichael, has worked closely with us through the reassessment process and praised our positive attitude to the scheme and to the safety of our visitor's vehicles:

"Chiltern District Council takes on board the advice administered by British Parking Association and the Police alike and is always looking to improve the service it provides."

The accredited police assessor deemed some of our car parks at a high enough standard to grant the award for the maximum of three years, demonstrating that we can be relied on to uphold these good standards and keep our car parks safe and free of crime.

Councillor Mike Smith, Cabinet Member for environmental management and engineering added: "Since joining the Safer Parking initiative in 2004, we have been actively pursuing the objectives of the scheme and I would like to give a special mention to Andy Clarke, our Parking Manager for his work in bringing our car parks up to such a high standard

THE CRC Performance League Table has placed Buckinghamshire County Council (BCC) 887th out of 2103 organisations nationally. BCC is ranked joint 93rd out of 198 participating local authorities nationally.

The table, from the Environment Agency, ranks participating organisations in terms of how they perform at reducing carbon emissions. Local authorities are ranked against other public and private organisations. 2010/11 is the first reporting year of the scheme, with results to be published annually going forward. Organisations' positions in this first league table are based on whether an organisation has taken early action to reduce energy consumption.

Steven Adams, Cabinet Member for Environment, said: "To achieve a position in the top half of the league table in what is the first year of the CRC scheme shows that the commitment we are placing on reducing carbon emissions throughout the Council is starting to garner results. We have been working hard over the last few years on a wide range of sustainability projects; we will continue to work hard to improve, particularly with schools, so that next year we can have achieved an even better result."

Total emissions reported by BCC for 2010-11 were 42,469 tCO<sub>2</sub>. Schools and academies are included in the BCC total and account for 68% of the Council's total figure. The County Council's Sustainability team work closely with the county's schools, engaging and supporting them with energy management and carbon reduction with initiatives such as energy workshops, supporting schools with the Eco-Schools award, offering interest free Salix loans for 'invest to save' energy efficiency projects and installing smart meters across the school portfolio. BCC is also participating in the Carbon Trust Collaborative Low Carbon Schools project this year, a scheme in which schools work together with their local authority, to become more energy efficient and develop energy strategies.

As well as the many energy efficiency projects in schools that have been funded by the BCC Salix fund, countywide projects have been implemented, such as replacing traffic lights with LED lamps and upgrading street lighting, as well as large IT projects at County Hall.

**THERE** is no denying that 2011 has been a tough year with the effects of the Eurozone crisis now having a very negative effect on our own UK economy and locally on our daily lives. Rising costs, difficult trading conditions and continuing financial turbulence, means challenging times for us all, says Martin Tett, Leader, Buckinghamshire County Council

For Councils up and down the country, the pressure of inflation and increasing demand for services is far outstripping the money available. It's challenging, and Councils like Buckinghamshire have to change radically as we collectively deliver the tough savings set by Government to reduce our enormous national spending deficit. As we move into 2012 there will be some tough times ahead. Nevertheless, there are grounds for optimism. For example, our budget plans for a second council tax freeze next year will put real money back in people's pockets; our priority of improving the condition of our roads, helping motorists and businesses, will be maintained and funding increased to £30m; grants to the voluntary and community sectors will continue unaffected and we are making sure we protect the most vulnerable.

Jobs remain one of my highest priorities. It's encouraging that latest data shows Buckinghamshire recording the highest level of business formation of any county council area, joining the 34,000 organisations that form the backbone of our local economy. We are also bucking the trend by beginning to reduce unemployment which again is good news. Nevertheless, I remain very concerned at the level of youth unemployment. Next year one of my top priorities will be to encourage businesses to take on more apprentices, as we have as a Council, to get our young people on the first rung of the career ladder. To encourage job creation we are also investing in a joint project with Hertfordshire to bring High Speed Broadband to rural areas of the county.

2012 also sees the Olympic and Paralympic Games which, as a host county, will bring economic benefits to Buckinghamshire. We can also look forward to the Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebrations, a chance to celebrate a moment in history. The county council, working with our colleagues in each District Council will be making it as simple and inexpensive as possible to hold street parties and other celebrations across the county.

Lastly, in the last few weeks we have also seen long-awaited Government support for East-West rail, a line from Oxford to Bedford which would link to Aylesbury and southern stations. By contrast we will continue to support our residents' opposition to the proposal for High Speed 2 cutting across the county.

**WARM** Homes healthy people group win grant.

Residents of Chiltern District can now benefit from Government funding aimed at keeping the most vulnerable people warm and well during the cold winter months.

Chiltern District Council together with partners Buckinghamshire County Council, United Sustainable Energy Agency, Age UK, Bucks Citizens Advice, Community Impact Bucks, Bucks PCT, Bucks Community Foundation and all the other district councils in Bucks have successfully bid to the Department of Health for £125,000 to help keep people well this winter.

The grant money will be used to mobilise a winter task force from each of the organisations as well as volunteers from the community to help people in practical ways. This will include supporting people to get all their eligible benefits, advice on how to make savings on fuel bills, help to improve their home insulation and heating systems and in some cases provide extra support in terms of food boxes. Being warm and well during winter can keep coughs and colds at bay, but can also protect you from serious illnesses such as pneumonia. Severe cold weather brings additional challenges, icy paths and roads severely reducing accessibility to buy food and attend medical appointments. The chances of these problems are higher if you are vulnerable to cold related illnesses because of one or more of the following:

- \* You are over 60
- \* You are on a low income (so cannot afford heating)
- \* You have a long-term health condition such as heart disease
- \* You are disabled

**SOLAR** panels will save council £150,000

The installation of 116 new solar panels on Buckinghamshire County Council buildings will generate an income of around £150,000 over 25 years, and save energy normally drawn from the National Grid - enough to make more than 140,000 cups of tea a year.

Installed as part of a government scheme, the council will be guaranteed a payment for every unit of electricity generated by the panels, giving Buckinghamshire taxpayers a return of 13-16 per cent on their investment. The scheme has been introduced to encourage the production of renewable energy by householders and businesses by providing cash benefits.

These solar panels have been installed on the flat roof of the council offices in Aylesbury, at Black Park Country Park, and at Aston Clinton household waste recycling centre.

Steven Adams, Cabinet Member for Environment, said: "We have installed these panels just in time as the tariff for new installations has been reduced by 50 per cent. By acting quickly we have secured the best possible long term income for the County Council."

"Energy saving measures like this are good for the environment and good for the Buckinghamshire council tax payer," said Steven. "I hope to be able to install many more across the council estate in the future." Steven explained the three sites would now be able to use the electricity they were generating to meet some of their energy demands. For Black Park Country Park this would generate an income of almost £1,500 a year and reduce the site's electricity bill by more than 30 per cent a year.
