**THANKFULLY** the Flooding in Chalfont St Peter has subsided, but for what seemed like an inordinate time, the centre of the village was a no-go area.

**County Councillor, David Martin**, brings us up to date with what is happening at the moment. "The Environment Agency has cleared the River Misbourne culverts beneath the Precinct which has increased the flow of water and improved local surface water drainage.

Transport for Bucks (TfB) on behalf of the County Council has jetted highways drainage gullies at the flood locations. These will work more effectively now the culverts have been cleared. Thames Water has removed the blockage in the sewer adjacent to the crossing on the A413.

Thames Water has installed a temporary pumping and filtering system to the front of the George. Water that would have flooded up from the sewer is now collected, filtered and discharged into to the Misbourne, thus preventing further flooding at this location. Until the danger of repeat flooding has abated, this will continue 24/7.

Residents will be aware that despite continuous requests, Thames water took over two weeks to respond to and fix the issues on the A413 and CSP centre. Their explanation is that the equipment used at both sites had been in continuous use at other locations including Wraysbury and Marlow, which were given higher priority than us. Engineers and plant were made available to us as soon as possible after more serious flooding and sewerage contamination had been dealt with elsewhere.

In the longer term I shall continue to press Thames Water to undertake a full network survey of their infrastructure throughout our village and carry out whatever remedial works are required to ensure that the unacceptable flooding we have experienced in recent years does not happen again.

Finally I pay tribute to the resilience and fortitude of our residents and business people whose homes and livelihoods have been threatened. I will give every assistance that I can to support all claims for compensation made to Thames water. Also, my appreciation of the support given by District Councillors and Officers. Finally, on behalf of all residents, I would like to thank our two brilliant TfB local Area Technicians , Michael Raven and Wayne Fabian, who have gone way beyond the extra mile, often in extremely difficult circumstances, to do whatever they could to deal with the challenge effectively.

The Chalfonts Neighbourhood Policing Team will be holding a "Cops and Coffee" event at Budgens, Market Place Chalfont St Peter on Wednesday 5th March from 1200 until 1300. This is an opportunity to meet with your local PCSO's and discuss any issues that you are experiencing in the village. They will have a supply of crime prevention advice and will be happy to answer any questions you may have.

**THAMES Valley** Police is advising people who own smart phones and other electrical items to protect them by installing a “tracker” application. Smart phones, laptops and tablet computers have become indispensable accessories and desirable to thieves. With recent Apple products an iCloud account will be installed. You can check this by looking in the “settings” menu and locate the Find my iPhone app. Ensure this is activated by swiping it to “Yes”.

Not all devices have this capability, but new iPhones, iPads and Samsung Galaxy phones have tracker apps provided by the manufacturers. It is best to consult the manufacturer about which applications are appropriate. If your device is stolen, act quickly. Inform the police and tell them you have a tracker application installed. You will need to have your username and password details available. Do not attempt to retrieve the device yourself as it could put you in danger. Your safety is more important than items of property.



**ARIVA** the bus company that runs the 353, 335 and A 40 buses will announce a big change on 31<sup>st</sup> March. It is proposed that the number of buses will be reduced and the 353 will only go from Slough to Amersham 2 hourly. It will only go to Amersham Hospital during the week and it doesn't run on Saturday at all. During the week it terminates at Amersham Station. The 335 will continue to run from Slough to Chalfont Common, with a new timetable (to be advised) and the A 30 will change to 730 and run from Uxbridge to Hemel Hempstead. Those who want to travel to Heathrow, will need to change to the A40 somewhere along the route.

This is going to mean a lack of provision for senior citizens who want to visit relatives and friends in Amersham Hospital and also a most irritating change of buses for those who want to avoid driving to Heathrow. I have only just heard about this and immediately sent a comment to the consultation committee at County Hall, but the deadline is 3<sup>rd</sup> March, so you have just one day to air your views to Mr A Clarke, Business Contracts Manager, on [passtrans@buckscc.gov.uk](mailto:passtrans@buckscc.gov.uk)

**THE BUCKS** Cut Films competition launched on Saturday 22 February in Eden Shopping Centre with local Wycombe Youth Action urban artist Dien Holland drawing a mural to demonstrate the negative influence of tobacco companies on Bucks youth. Local young people got involved by drawing their name in a graffiti style to a pledge wall to say 'no' to smoking.

Cut Films is working with Buckinghamshire County Council's Public Health Team on the competition, which tackles the issue of young people and smoking using film and social media. Almost 600 people have died this year in Buckinghamshire from smoking related diseases.

The competition gets local young people to research the effects of tobacco or smoking, make a two minute short film about it for their friends, upload it to the competition website and share it on their social media.

This innovative peer-to-peer approach engages young people with the issues around smoking. Their film will persuade their friends not to smoke and to give up if they already do.

James Skinner, Bucks Cut Films Youth Worker, said: "We're really excited about seeing the talent of young film makers across Bucks. This isn't just an anti-tobacco film competition, it's a way for young people to learn new skills, campaign against tobacco companies and protect their friends."

Jo Wilson, Public Health Practitioner at Bucks County Council, said: "We are really excited to be running another Cut Films project in Bucks. Last year some great films were submitted showing how young people think about the dangers of smoking. Currently around 58,500 adults smoke in Bucks, and some 80% of these will have started before the age of 18. We need to stop today's children becoming tomorrow's smokers through engaging with them on their level and encouraging them to think about the impact smoking can have on individuals, families and communities."

The competition closes on 2 May 2014. Young people will then have three weeks to get their friends, parents and community to vote for their favourite film. A special Bucks panel of judges will choose the overall winner of the Buckinghamshire Cut Films Competition.

### **E-ACT Academies in Buckinghamshire**

The DfE has recently announced that E-ACT, a charity that sponsors 34 state-funded schools, is planning to transfer control of ten of them and that new sponsors will be sought.

It has been confirmed that the three existing E-ACT academies in the south of the County are not among the schools affected. They are (with their previous names in brackets):

- Chalfont Valley E-ACT Primary Academy, Little Chalfont (Bell Lane Combined);
- Burnham Park E-ACT Academy (Burnham Upper) and
- Denham Green E-ACT Academy (Tilehouse Combined).

However, this decision does mean that the transfer of Little Spring School, Chesham to E-ACT will not be taking place as planned. The County Council is now working with Little Spring School, the Buckinghamshire Learning Trust and the Department for Education to agree alternative long-term management arrangements for the school.

Mike Appleyard, Cabinet Member for Education and Skills said, "I want to reassure parents that the County Council maintains overall responsibility for school standards regardless of the provider. On behalf of ourselves and schools, the Buckinghamshire Learning Trust looks to work with all schools including academies to ensure that the highest standards are maintained and, where issues emerge, they are resolved as quickly as possible."

**THE** Chilterns Crematorium Joint Committee, which owns and operates the Chilterns Crematorium in Amersham on behalf of Aylesbury Vale, Chiltern and Wycombe District Councils, has signed an option agreement to purchase a piece of land to the north of Aylesbury on which a new crematorium could be built, subject to planning.

Councillor Mike Smith, Chairman of the Chilterns Crematorium Joint Committee said: "The Chilterns Crematorium was opened in March 1966 and serves the local community well. With the population of Bucks growing, particularly in the Aylesbury area, it has become apparent over the last couple of years that there is a need for a new crematorium in the north of the County. We spent many years looking for a site and this one was found to be the most suitable."

The site is in a mainly rural area off the A418 between the villages of Rowsham and Bierton.

Surveys of the land have started and will be followed by a pre-planning consultation during March to seek the views of local residents and their representatives on the proposed scheme. The consultation will include an exhibition and drop-in sessions on Thursday 13 March at the Jubilee Hall, Aylesbury Road, Bierton HP22 5DL from 3pm to 8pm.

Letters with more details have been sent out to residents. It is anticipated that the Chilterns Crematorium Joint Committee will put a planning application into Aylesbury Vale District Council in late Spring/early Summer.

**A NEW DEBT** Counselling centre in Chalfonts named as one of 239 centres across UK. LOCAL people struggling with overwhelming debt are set to get free help from an acclaimed charity opening a new hub in the Chalfonts.

Growing debt counselling charity Christians Against Poverty (CAP) has partnered with churches in the area to extend its in-depth service from Chesham, Amersham and Beaconsfield to the Chalfont St Peter and Gerrards Cross area. Chalfonts CAP Hub manager David Fletcher from Gold Hill Baptist Church, located in Chalfont St Peter said: "The Church has always been about offering hope and we're really pleased to be able to give a tried-and-tested route out of debt alongside other great free debt advice in the area like the Citizens Advice Bureau.

"There is a lot in the Bible about looking after the poorest but in our society a lot of poverty is debt-related and it's not at all unusual for many apparently well-off people to be held hostage by debt. That's why our congregation has been working hard to open a CAP hub to help get people back on track."

CAP offers people a uniquely in-depth, caring service to people with spiralling personal debt. Every client is visited in their own home, the charity does all the negotiating with creditors and local volunteers offer support to each person face-to-face until the day they are debt free.

The charity has 239 centres around the UK currently supporting £73m of secondary debts for its clients regardless of income, age, gender, background or faith. The free debt counselling has won a string of accolades including being described as "unsurpassed" by TV's Money Saving Expert Martin Lewis.
