**OUR** Neighbourhood Policing newsletter provides the following information:

Your Neighbourhood Police Team carried out speed enforcement. The locations we used were the ones identified to us by the residents of Chalfont St Peter. We dealt with drivers who were using mobile phones, drivers plus their passengers failing to wear their seat belts and other motoring offences including no insurance. In Lower Road we caught 5 speeders and 8 motorists failing to wear seat belts plus 2 motorists using a mobile phone whilst driving. On Denham Lane we caught 5 speeders, 4 failing to wear seatbelts and 2 driving whilst using mobile phones. On Austenway & Austenwood Lane 4 motorists were caught exceeding the speed limit and 3 for failing to wear a seatbelt. Our next speed enforcement day is October 7<sup>th</sup> 2010 (you have been warned!!).

**ANOTHER** issue identified was Anti Social Behaviour in and around the village; we are working alongside other agencies such as Paradigm Housing and the Youth Inclusion Support Panel (YISP) to work with youths who are engaging in Anti Social Behaviour in our area. We are also issuing ABC's (Acceptable Behaviour Contracts) to address the youth's behaviour. The flower beds in the centre of the village have been attacked and plants strewn around the Market Place area. A group of youths was caught and dealt with.

**EXCERPTS** from Off the Record – the Centre for Buckinghamshire quarterly review, are very interesting and coincide with the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the start of the Blitz in September.

As part of the work they have been doing on launching their new 'Bombs over Bucks' database, they have spoken to several local residents who have personal recollections of bombing events and have been able to provide more information about what happened. One such recollection has been given recently by Mr. John Reed, who was living on Nightingale Road in Southcourt when the so-called 'land-mine' incident occurred in September 1940

"By September 1940 we had become rather blasé about alerts, and remained in bed unless anything happened. On 25 September 1940 the siren had gone when there was a loud explosion (we later heard that it was a bomb that fell in the Buckingham Road area). Mother shouted "Bombs are falling, John!" and we quickly rose to go down to the coal-cellar. I had only got as far as the landing when the 'land-mine' went off; I don't remember the bang but I vividly remember starting to be propelled down the stairs but Dad caught me just in time. Granny was the last one down— she dived headlong over the arm of the settee and fainted upside down. The back door, locked and bolted, was blown open and our dog ran down the garden barking with indignation. "Who let that dog out?" shouted Dad. There were no further incidents that night. [...] A member of my family remembered that scores of small tortoise-shell butterflies that had been hibernating in the eaves had been blown out and littered the pavement all round the house."

In a new section on the website, Archive of the Month, we look to highlight some of the fascinating corners of our collections that many of our customers are unaware of. August's edition focussed on the use of a Little Brickhill parish register to provide evidence of the holding of the Court of Assizes there and of the effects of the plague on the village. For September, along with the launch of our new database 'Bombs over Bucks' (see article elsewhere in this newsletter) we look at the Air Raid Precautions reports. October will use the earliest Vehicle Licensing Register to tell us more about an early photograph of a car crash outside Marlow. Archive of the Month is available in the 'Online Resources' section [www.buckscc.gov.uk/archives](http://www.buckscc.gov.uk/archives). The originals used are on display in the Archives Searchroom each month.

Following the success of our research guide on 'Pubs and Publicans', the Centre for Buckinghamshire Studies has just released a new guide to Bucks Prisoners. The guide will tell you where to look for your criminal ancestors in the county, with sections detailing the records of the Quarter Sessions, Assizes, Petty Sessions, Debtors and the Special Assizes set up to try those accused of taking place in the Swing Riots. ## **BUCKS** Copycat Campaign paves the way for safer driving

Young children learn by copying what their parents do and say, so it makes sense that if they witness their mum or dad driving badly, they're likely to mimic these poor driving habits when they grow up and get behind the wheel themselves.

After research highlighted the extent of the problem - 54% of parents admitted to poor road safety behaviour in front of their children and one third of all serious injuries involve young drivers aged 17-24 - Transport for Buckinghamshire has taken action and joined up with Thames Valley Police to develop the CopyCat Campaign and try to counteract this potentially dangerous copycat behaviour.

Launching in schools across Buckinghamshire this month, the CopyCat Campaign has a long-term goal of reducing the number of young drivers killed or seriously injured on the road. With these youngsters having observed their parents' driving habits for the first 17 years of their lives, the campaign is setting out to make parents understand it is crucial they improve their driving habits and take more care when setting an example to their children. If successful, it's hoped that the CopyCat Campaign will then be rolled out across the country.

Cleverly, the Campaign uses the children themselves (aged six and seven) to relay the message back to mum and dad that they must behave behind the wheel. Little Tikes has also come on board with the Campaign and is delighted that their iconic car, the red and yellow Cozy Coupe, will be used in helping to make the road safety messages fun for the children. The toy company is also providing prizes for the CopyCat Campaign - winners will be chosen following the March 2011 closing date and one school in each of the four district councils in Buckinghamshire will win a Little Tikes playset.

Schools that have signed up to the CopyCat campaign will have a visit by a Police Community Support Officer and the children will be shown a fun presentation that illustrates how their parents should drive. Topics covered will include keeping below the speed limit, concentrating at the wheel, switching off mobile phones before starting the journey, wearing a seatbelt and using the correct car seats for children. Each child will then be given a similar DVD to take home to watch and discuss with their parents, plus a simple worksheet will be filled in and returned to school.

## **PICK** up free emergency booklet and Be Ready for Anything

Do you know how to cope in an emergency? A handy new guide explaining everything you ever wanted to know about emergencies but were afraid to ask is now available. The free booklet can be picked up from most libraries, district and parish council buildings, and County Hall, Walton Street, Aylesbury. 'Are you Ready?' is published by the Thames Valley Local Resilience Forum, of which Buckinghamshire County Council is a member. The guide contains information to help people prepare for a whole range of emergencies, such as floods, extreme weather and outbreaks of disease.

As winter approaches, people need to start thinking about how they might cope if they get stuck in their car in the snow or break down? By following the simple advice and handy tips, you can make sure you have the appropriate kit in your car, identify an 'emergency friend' who will look after your children if you can't get back, and have the necessary supplies at home.

Buckinghamshire County Council's Deputy Leader Bill Chapple who praised the guide as easy-to-read, common sense advice, said: "There is valuable home and fire safety advice that could help to save lives. We want to help people prepare for an emergency, in the hope it will never happen."

Andy Fyfe, Resilience Manager for Buckinghamshire County Council, said: "Everyone should make sure they have a household emergency plan so you and your family know what to do, who to call or where to go in an emergency. Having a 'grab-bag' of essential items is also useful preparation in case you need to leave your home quickly."

#### **SPECIAL** ale will aid Coombe Hill Monument restoration

Chiltern Brewery's new bottled Monument Ale is to be launched to help raise funds for the much-needed restoration of the landmark Coombe Hill monument in Buckinghamshire.

The Buckinghamshire County Council-owned monument, honouring the men of the county who died in the Boer War more than 100 years ago, is undergoing restoration at a cost of £55,000. The appeal fund is now just £5000 short of its target.

Monument Ale, coincidentally released in Chiltern Brewery's 30th anniversary year, went on sale on September 20, and at least 25p from every bottle sold will support the restoration appeal.

The special brew came about as a result of a conversation between restoration project leader Mark Bailey and Chiltern Brewery's Head Brewer Tom Jenkinson, who was keen to help the project.

'I dropped into the brewery, mentioned the need for funds and to my surprise, Tom suggested they supported the appeal with a special brew!' said Mark.

Tom said the monument appeal and the brewery's 30th anniversary made an excellent pairing for a not-for-profit ale. 'We're in the shadow of Coombe Hill, and we can see the monument clearly from the brewery,' said Tom. 'Our Monument Ale is a wonderful, traditional Chiltern Brewery brew using favourite ingredients from the past 30 years as well as some new tastes to excite the palate.'

The restored monument including its two bronze flags and new up-to-date plaque will be rededicated at a ceremony on October 20 led by the Bishop of Buckingham, the Rt Rev Dr Alan Wilson.

#### **COUNTY** council challenges Transport Secretary over HS2 plans

Transport Secretary Philip Hammond is in no doubt about the overwhelming opposition in Buckinghamshire to plans for the High Speed 2 (HS2) rail link through the Chilterns, following talks with Buckinghamshire County Council Cabinet members Valerie Letheren and Martin Tett.

They spoke with Mr Hammond at a meeting sponsored by Chesham and Amersham MP Cheryl Gillan on Wednesday (September 22). The purpose of the meeting was to allow Mr Hammond to hear first hand from local representatives and organisations their views on the Coalition Government's HS2 proposal.

'We fully support investment in our transport infrastructure but believe that this is the wrong strategy,' said Valerie Letheren, Cabinet Member for Transportation. 'The business case just doesn't add up. Additionally, investment in this project is money not spent on improving existing roads and rail services across the country. I called upon Mr Hammond to fully review this entire proposal.'

Martin Tett, Cabinet Member for Planning and Environment, said: 'He was left in no doubt about the strength of local opinion on this topic. The Chilterns are a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) which should be protected for the nation. I called upon this Government to honour its pre-election commitment to review all possible routes, including the alternative West Coast main line and M1 corridors.' The county council adopted a policy on April 22 opposing the HS2 project, rejecting the business case, and calling for protection of the Chilterns AONB. It has supported local protest groups, organised a series of summit meetings on the proposal, and recently took local members, parish councillors and residents to see the HS1 route in Kent, where they heard about the problems caused by the route, and in particular the construction work.

Full consultation on the Coalition Government's preferred route will commence in early 2011, but in the meantime further work needs to be done on both the business case and mitigation measures on the preferred route, admitted Mr Hammond.

## **Chalfont St Peter Xmas Fun Night - Stalls selling fast!**

The Chalfont St Peter Xmas Fun Night organised by the Chalfont St Peter Chamber of Commerce will take place on Friday 3rd December between 6pm and 8.30pm.
