CHALFONT COMMON WI : “I’m not vertically challenged – I am a dwarf.” And proud of it too, according to actor Rusty Goffe who, at 4ft 2ins tall, was the guest speaker at the February meeting of the Chalfont Common WI. His engrossing talk on being a dwarf from birth to approaching his 60th birthday was spiced with humour and witty observations tempered by some of the unthinking comments of the public. He said that despite bullying at school because of his size, he had a very enjoyable life, thanks in no small way to a very loving and understanding mother. In his younger years she made all his clothes and was source of comfort whenever thoughtless remarks were made about him. “Why,” a child would ask, “is that man so short?” Instead of explaining the parent might respond “because he doesn’t eat his greens.” As his friends grew and he did not it took time for him to realize he was different but he took music lessons, joined the Scouts and played in the band.” But marching in time was tricky,” he quipped. As a teenager he was bullied unmercifully and on one occasion was thrown into the sea, leaving him with a dread of water.

On the plus side dwarves are in great demand in show business and Rusty has enjoyed a successful career in films including Stars Wars and Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory. The rogue gene responsible for the deformity had been discovered by the son of a dwarf who was a consultant. He had wanted to be a brain surgeon but wasn’t tall enough. Another dwarf of his acquaintance was an American girl who could speak 17 languages. In three-quarters of cases where the rogue was present the parents were of normal height. Sadly, many dwarfs suffered special ailments including ear and nasal problems because of their narrow sinuses. Spinal problems were also a major handicap. Rusty, whose wife is 5ft 7ins, has two teenage sons who are both dwarves. His inspiration throughout his life had been his mother who had always encouraged him and now, at 92, had bought herself a computer to keep her mind active and to communicate with the family by email. AT the Village Appraisal Group AGM on 12th February, Linda Smith Chairman talked of the advances made since first meeting approx. 4 years ago., thanked all the volunteers and said some people are working on two, or maybe even three groups. Local councils had acknowledged the importance of our groups as forerunners of this initiative. Her first theme was the transformation of the Tithe Barn youth Club, then the formation of VOPAG the official voice of for the over 55's in CSP. They about to get a crossing over the A413. County Council as agreed it should be in place by the end of March. Positioned just behind the island at Gravel Hill. The provision is linked to the 'walk to school' scheme for children at the Middle School.

A main focus at the moment is the 'health check' that is intended to highlight strengths and weaknesses , transport and traffic, environment and economy and said that one of our weaknesses is that we don't promote our strengths.

Sandy Warren of the Environment and Heritage Group discussed a lottery grant to help develop the riverside walk and to clear out the river of rubbish and re-site the recycling centre. They want to naturalise the area and plant bluebells, daffodils and snowdrops. There were plans for extra signage at Mill Meadow for sports and recreation facilities and our interest in the Misbourne could be a catalyst for a project.

Megan Wall Safety and Youth Club said that the Youth Club was a lovely, vibrant organisation where attendance over the past two and a half years was 100 attendees a week and in January this year the attendance was 130 per week . There are 38 volunteers spread over 3 days a week to help out in the Youth Centre.

The subway project has been a great success. The young people have learnt a lot from it. They had to apply for grants and got them and some money is still there for further projects.

During the year a number of their members spent a weekend away and others spent a day at Thorpe Park. Rotary Clubs of Misbourne Matins, Chalfont St Peter and Gerrards Cross all made donations.

Corrinne Jeffrey said that VOPAG deals with the interests of over 55's in CSP. Things have to be planned ahead of time and by encouraging the younger members of the 'Older Person's' group, we are building an active base for this section of the community. She wants to encourage everyone to come to the monthly meetings , 10am for 10.30 in the Parish Council Offices.

VOPAG also initiated the Budgen's Police Surgery which is of benefit to both local people and to the Police, who get useful information. They are associated with many initiatives. Speakers on subjects of interest have been well received by the meetings and subjects covered were: the making of a Youth Club video, connections of the generations., Roads and Potholes, travel tokens, eye testing for drivers, Dial a Ride and the meetings also provide the chance to seek opinions of those present about various issues of concern to the over 55's.

Ian Corbett Group leader for transport and traffic said that shortage of funding only enabled spending on emergencies. He said that he had written to object to on-street parking. Shopkeepers really don't want this either. There was a possibility that one of our buses, the 353, is under threat. Bucks County Council will leave things for a few months to see how they go, then they will review the situation. The 305 is had its route redirected and it takes 20 minutes longer to go round by Flackwell Heath, but it is hoped to return to its regular route in the near future..

Heathrow extensions caused a lot of discussion and leaflets are now in the community centre and other places giving more detail. It was reported that planes coming in to Heathrow 7am – 11pm half the height than at present.

Street lighting – Bucks County Council want to extend street lighting switch off which will cover Denham roundabout to GX and Beaconsfield. Beyond Tatling End to GX and Missenden. - 25 miles. There was annoyance that we have not been included in the consultation for this.

Tony Shinner representing Village Action and Think Tank Groups indicates that they seek to use good offices with the police to facilitate discussion to work in partnership with groups in Chafont St Peter where they run Neighbourhood Watch schemes. Their job is to increase neighbourhood watch by canvassing You are 75% less likely to be burgled if you live in a neighbourhood watch scheme area. The groups are also involved with the local Police Surgery. The Safety group was very pleased with the information exchange that was facilitated by this . Also the group is involved with schools and school governors.

Heritage Group was influenced by visiting local museums such as Chesham and Amersham to get information as to how to set out our Chalfont St Peter heritage display. County Councillor, Pam Bacon, who leads the group. wasn't able to attend, but reports were made on her behalf. Help came from Denny Robbins of the Amersham Museum and Denis Skinner of CDC who showed enthusiasm for the project. More permanent premises are needed eventually and also they are looking for local people to come forward to do research into links between time and trends. We need some objectives and also a home in the village where we can exhibit it as an ancient village and show the developing heritage through the talents of current villagers. A website is planned and Tony Shinner would like to do something regarding village recollections.

Treasurer Mike Miller presented the accounts for the year and mentioned the £10,000 grant which we are about to start using as the work in the village gets under way.

The meeting ended with a power point presentation of the painting of the walls in the passage under the A413 and we saw the young people in action, showing how talented they are. Working as a team to create the project and get the funding, meant that they were transformed by their own involvement and giving, which was the theme of the film. The Youth Centre aims to be a transformation of young people's lives through guidance and opportunities. Volunteers add to this and as the youth members grow up they want to contribute to the younger members and many of them become volunteers themselves. The artwork in the subway was another example of this. The young people applied for the funding and did so very professionally. There are now other communities visiting the site to learn from what they have done.

FRANCES CHIDELL reports on **Ann Widdecombe's** visit to the luncheon at Beaconsfield Golf Club. She says:

After some political speakers have sat down, one can be left wondering exactly what they said. Not so with Ann Widdecombe, MP for Maidstone and Weald. With her as speaker the lunch of the Conservative Women's Organisation, Beaconsfield Constituency, on February 8, was a sell-out. Her talk was amusing and down to earth and she gave ample time for questions. As her message rang a bell with the audience, there were not only questions afterwards, but several members added their personal experiences to reinforce her argument.

This was that Political Correctness and our compensation culture were having an oppressive effect on the British way of life. ³We must not accept this state oppression as the norm,² she said. Getting this message to non-voters and encouraging them to vote would ensure Conservatives won the next election.

The government should tell the truth. For example, it was dishonest about the NHS which was inevitably underfunded because. compared to the forties when it was established, current procedures were like rocket science. In answer to complaints about the state of hospitals, she said the role of hospital Sisters should be reinstated.

As to whether David Cameron or William Hague would make the better Prime Minister she said David Cameron would be Prime Minister soon, and Hague later. She said she would like David Cameron to use television more. An audience in the House of Commons amounts to a few dozen but on television you can get an audience of millions. She was not in favour of all-women candidate lists, or of disestablishing the Church of England, or of a set retirement age. The possibility of Tony Blair as President of Europe was ³horrifying.²

Before the lunch Miss Widdecombe signed copies of her five novels, donating proceeds to the lunch, and said she was resigning her seat at the next election and couldn't wait to settle in her Devon cottage and write more books. Mrs Maureen Royston, in thanking her, said her common sense was what we understand and what we want to hear. Mrs Maureen Worrall, Chairman, CWO, presented her with a picture of Beaconsfield.

WORD is that all the Speed Cameras in the Variable Speed Limit section of the M25 near Heathrow Airport (JCT 10-15) are going Digital and the activation limit is being lowered.

They are currently the older film type cameras and Set at 90mph when the Variable Limit Signs are not in operation. The new digital cameras are going to be set at the normal national speed limit +10% + 2mph (at 80mph you are taking a risk) when the signs are not in use. I can't confirm the activation limit when the signs are set (variable limits showing) but believe that it would be the same 10% + 2mph of the speed shown by the sign at that time."

Most modern car speedometers are about right at 30mph but do get progressively inaccurate as the speed increases but you cant rely on this. Sticking to the limit as shown is the safest option. If you read the motoring section of the Telegraph you may have seen the number of complaints from drivers done for speeding at just 33mph when caught on a digital trap. Motoring fines are now a huge source of income for our wonderful government / councils. Only this week it was reported that Westminster council raised £33m from just parking fines last year. Trouble is none of it goes toward making the roads better.

ONE Hundred Years of Tennis - The Gerrards Cross Lawn Tennis Club celebrates its centenary. Frances Chidell reports on this club which sits on the borders of Chalfont St Peter and Gerrards Cross and she says: It's strange but true that people can live in Gerrards Cross for years and not know of the Gerrards Cross Lawn Tennis Club in Bull Lane, which celebrates its centenary this year. The new chairman, Graham Marsh, and his talented team are hatching plans thick and fast to mark this achievement by improving the club's facilities and extending its activities. With around 800 members - and they would like more - the club has no less than 17 courts: seven grass, five artificial grass and five hard. There's a mini-tennis area for children. This makes it the biggest tennis club in Bucks.

How did it start? The Rev. J.M. Glubb, Vicar of St James's Church, took the chair at the club's inception in November 1908 when he and his associates looked into the cost of three courts. It was soon up and running, but only six years later with the arrival of the first World War, times were hard. Many tennis clubs closed. But Bull Lane kept going and by 1932 there were 13 grass courts and three hard courts. Again war starting in 1939 slowed everything down, and again persistent members managed to keep the club going through the war years and eventually it became one of the leading clubs in the county.

Tennis buffs know that such Wimbledon stars as Butch Buckholtz, Rod Laver, Ken Rosewall, Lew Hoad and Bjorn Borg have all given demonstrations there on the carefully maintained grass courts. Nowadays the club has an extensive coaching scheme for members, and for local schools, from seven qualified coaches directed by the Head Pro Andy Scholfield. As well as Premier League Men's and Women's teams plus other adult teams, there are over 20 Junior teams. Their successes are frequently recorded in the local newspapers.
