


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Chalfont St Peter Village Voice December 2011

THE Colours of Spain was the title of the concert given by four experienced singers most capably accompanied on the piano by Joseph Middleton. They were Julia Sporsen, soprano; Clara Mouriz, mezzo-soprano; Joshua Ellicott, tenor, and Marcus Farnsworth, baritone. Each could be said to be at the top of their profession and we were lucky to hear them in Beaconsfield.

All the songs described romantic aspects of Spain, set to music written by 19th century German and French composers -- although the first group was by Joaquin Turina, a Spaniard. These were most dramatically sung by Clara Mouriz.

Joshua Ellicott had a strong, clear voice, shown so softly in the Brahms dream and double forte in Der Hildago, the defiant lover, by Schumann. Further highlights were Marcus Farnsworth's cameo of the life of a Toreador, and his impersonation of a jolly smuggler. Julia Sporsen's soprano was shown to advantage in Ravel's coloratura study without words.

Duets and quartets followed after the interval and we felt reassured us that the art of lieder singing, though rarely performed, is vitally alive.

Beaconsfield High School pupils started what we hope will be a new tradition. On arrival we were played in by Emily Croft, (18), on saxophone accompanied by Alan Lewis, music master. After the interval, we were treated to Bach and Chopin by the gifted pianist Hannah Bennett (17).

THE Road Safety Team at Transport for Buckinghamshire is pleased to announce that they have been awarded a Prince Michael International Road Safety Commendation for the "Be a Better Biker" motorcycle scheme.

Prince Michael International Road Safety Awards and Commendations are presented throughout the year to individuals, companies or organisations in recognition of their outstanding contribution to improving road safety.

The campaign's main message is about the importance of taking further training by attending an assessment day.

Peter Hardy, Buckinghamshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Planning and Transport said: "The overwhelming demand for places on these courses has enabled more motorcyclists to stay safe on the roads and the endorsement from Prince Michael can only pay testament to its success."

As part of the assessment day, riders are taken out on the roads where motorcycle casualties have previously occurred. The 'Be a Better Biker' campaign, has promoted the benefits of post-test training, to ensure that a biker's riding capabilities best match those of their machine.

Since the courses began in 2004 there has been a significant drop in biker crashes on the roads of Buckinghamshire.

Part of the criteria for receiving the commendation was to demonstrate that the scheme has a good track record with a proven sustainable outcome.

From 2011 the campaign has grown to be Thames Valley wide with support and endorsement from the Thames Valley Police, Bucks Fire and Rescue and neighbouring local authorities. This means there are now assessment days in Buckinghamshire, Milton Keynes, Oxfordshire and Berkshire.

The initiative has in past years been runner up in two national awards, The National Transport Awards and the Highways Magazine Excellence Awards.

A DIAMOND opportunity' to celebrate in 2012 got the full endorsement of Buckinghamshire County Council members. It came in response to Leader Martin Tett's landmark notice of motion calling on the council to make the most of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games for Buckinghamshire, a host authority, and to support community involvement in Games-inspired activities.

Landmark because it is the first time, Martin believed, that a motion had been proposed and seconded by members of two different political parties. Seconding was Liberal Democrat member Niknam Hussain, who said the Games and the Queen's Jubilee provided a once-in-a-lifetime diamond opportunity to celebrate. Martin said that with Dorney Lake, in the south of the county, hosting rowing, sprint-canoeing and adaptive rowing, and Buckinghamshire's pivotal role in the birth and development of the Paralympic Games from its origins at Stoke Mandeville, the county had a year of opportunity in 2012 to 'turn the corner on the gloom of 2011'.

A new officer team is developing a programme of activity, including a community celebration toolkit. 'This will make it really simple for people in every town and village to celebrate,' said Martin. And he urged Members to work with their communities to ensure 2012 was a year of celebration for Buckinghamshire.

A call echoed by Niknam Hussain, who urged Members to use their leaders' funds to help communities take advantage of the opportunity to mark the events. 'This isn't just a sporting event, but a cultural event and I urge Members of this council to take seriously their community leadership role,' he said.

Buckinghamshire will feature as part of the Olympic Torch Relay tour in July 2012, and will host the important Paralympic Torch Festival at Stoke Mandeville on August 28. These events form the centrepiece of a programme of community celebrations embracing the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in June, and the Games throughout the summer.

Members voted unanimously to support the motion that:

This Council fully supports the efforts of Members, officers and partners to deliver the host authority commitments and to maximise the economic, social and sporting benefits for our communities associated with hosting of the Olympic & Paralympic Games.

Cabinet Members have recently considered findings of the recent Scrutiny Review "Is Buckinghamshire Ready?" which looked at the requirements for delivering the host authority commitments and arising opportunities. This Council urges all Members to support community involvement in Games inspired events and activities within their divisions.

THIS is a Community Message from Thames Valley Police Having received a number of calls regarding the introduction of the new 101 non-emergency number, hopefully the following information will provide answers to the frequently asked questions:

101 is a national single non-emergency number that all police forces are going to be using by 2012 and will replace the Thames Valley Police 0845 8 505 505 (non-emergency) number.

When is Thames Valley Police going live?

Thames Valley Police went live with 101 on 14 November 2011, alongside South Yorkshire, Nottinghamshire, Lincolnshire, Kent, Sussex, Humberside, Greater Manchester and West Yorkshire.

When to call 101?

You should call 101 to report less urgent crime and disorder or to speak to your local officers.

For example, you should call 101 if:

- your car has been stolen
- your property has been damaged
- you suspect drug use or dealing in your neighbourhood

Or to:

- report a minor traffic collision
- give the police information about crime in your area
- speak to the police about a general enquiry

101 is being introduced as part of the Government's wider work to improve access to the police, ease pressure on 999, and help to efficiently and effectively tackle crime and disorder.

What is the difference between 101 and 999?

You should continue to call 999 when it is an emergency, such as when a crime is in progress, when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened.

How much will it cost the caller?

Calls to 101 (from both landlines and mobile networks) cost 15 pence per call, no matter what time of day the call is made, or the duration of the call. Everyone calling the police for non-emergency matters will now know exactly how much a call will cost them, and can be assured of equal access whether they are on a pay-as-you-go mobile or a home landline.

How does the routing of the call work?

The routing will be based on the same system as 999 calls which links a caller's dialling code to the police force that covers that geographic area. Calls from a landline will be routed to the nearest police force that covers the area's dialling code. If the caller is using a mobile, the call will be routed using the location of the mast that the phone is transmitting from.

If a call is made to 101 within a police force area that has not yet 'gone live', the caller will hear a recorded message telling them to redial using the relevant non-emergency number.

Who will answer my 101 call?

Calls to 101 are answered by police call handlers in the control room of the local police force. This ensures that staff with local knowledge can answer and deal with the calls and respond appropriately.

You will not be put through to a large national call centre. When you call 101, the system will determine your location and connect you to the police force covering that area. You will hear a recorded message announcing the police force you are being connected to. If you are on a boundary between two or more forces, the recorded message will give you a choice of which force to be connected to.

I am deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired, can I call 101?

Yes, you can text/phone 18001 101.

What if English is not my first language?

Your local police have access to professional interpreters so they can quickly translate your call if you have difficulty speaking English.

What about reporting general nuisance or environmental issues?

You should continue to call your local council for things like:

reporting graffiti
dog fouling
abandoned vehicles
dumping and fly tipping
vandalism.

What should I do if the 101 number is currently blocked on the phone at my workplace / college / business premises?

As 101 is a new number, some business phone systems and switchboards may not yet be programmed to recognise 101. Please contact the person who administers your phone system to request that access is opened to the 101 number.

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
