Abuse survivor urges people to help put an end to domestic violence

This is a message sent via Thames Valley Alert. This information has been sent on behalf of Thames Valley Police*

A domestic abuse survivor who has been in two abusive relationships is urging other victims to reach out and get help, or to speak up if you know of someone who is being abused.

We would like to raise awareness about the extent of domestic abuse - that it is not just physical violence but can include emotional, psychological and financial abuse.

For Jackie (43) who lives in High Wycombe, every day is an opportunity to educate others about the problem by sharing her own story of abuse, triumph and advocacy.

She said: "During the abuse I was completely isolated from my friends and family, most of whom were hundreds of miles away. I felt I had no self-worth, regarded myself as a bad mother for letting this man into our lives, as well as suffocated and trapped by his presence. He abused alcohol and drugs, which made him completely paranoid.

"As a result he answered my calls, checked my texts and emails and insisted on knowing my passwords and bank pin numbers. I couldn't even go to the doctor on my own.

"Throughout the years I would call the police, he'd be arrested, he would wear me down by constantly calling, texting, pleading me to give him another chance, saying it would never happen again."

Eventually, with help from the Thames Valley Police (TVP) Domestic Violence and Abuse Unit, Women's Aid, social services, a very understanding GP and counsellor, Jackie finally managed to break free.

She continued: "For the first time in years I could do whatever I wanted, when I wanted. I had to re-build my life and it did take a long time but I now run a coffee morning and choir for women whose lives have been affected by domestic violence and abuse. I believe the support we give each other is invaluable. I don't see myself as a victim anymore."

Martin Phillips, Buckinghamshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Community Engagement said: "We are committed to creating a safer county and one of our priorities is doing everything in our power to help combat domestic violence.

“We want to get the message across that it’s a horrific crime that affects people from all walks of life regardless of age, sex, class and background. It is often misunderstood and even a taboo subject which means incidents are under reported.

“I hope our activities lead to more victims realising what’s going on and getting help. Our message is clear – don’t suffer in silence.”
