Cheryl Gillan, MP for Chesham and Amersham, writes about a highly important current local issue:

LIKE many Chalfont St Peter residents, I really value our Green Belt and want to see it preserved. I do not want to see the unique character of our towns and villages altered by over-development. Members of Parliament cannot and should not take decisions over planning, which are properly delegated to local planning authorities. However, I have campaigned against the extra numbers of houses which are being imposed by central government because I do not think these can be absorbed without detriment to the village. Chiltern District Council will be holding a public consultation on the draft Core Strategy which covers housing so please do look at the planning portal on

REPORT on the Housing and Planning Overview Committee meeting at Chiltern District Council Offices on 21st January.

The debate was very measured. The Chairman opened by explaining that there would anyway be a further six week period of consultation with the public after the Cabinet had made any changes arising from this meeting. The officers and Nick Rose and Don Phillips extolled the supposed benefits of the Core Strategy, that it does provide a basis for making planning decisions, replacing the now out-of-date 1997 Adopted Local Plan. They also expressed concern about the downside of failing to agree the Core Strategy, that we (Chiltern District) would lose appeals (lose doubly by having to pay costs and still have the development built) and that we might be forced to find the land for yet another five years of new houses.

They told us that the South East Regional plan is now statutory law. It could not be swept away by an incoming government. That would require new primary legislation. The officers felt that Chiltern had been let off very lightly. Because of our Green Belt and Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty we had been given the fourth lowest target in the south east.

On the subject of relocating schools or hospitals, Carol Castle said that CDC cannot make it happen. The health or education authorities and the landowners had to propose such developments and none had. The Cabinet had decided not build in the Green Belt because residents were always against it. Overall the officers felt that the new Core Strategy as proposed was the least bad option.

All four of the Chalfont St Peter Councillors who are not in the Cabinet spoke. **Geoff Peters (Central ward)** said that the draft Core Strategy was not yet fit to be approved. The officers and Cabinet need to make their case and explain the sanctions more clearly and without jargon. He urged the public to participate in the forthcoming consultation.

John Wertheim (Austenwood ward) pointed out that the government had decreed that "... densities below 30 dwellings per hectare must be justified." This is more than twice the current figure. It has ruined the Packhorse Road and must be reviewed. He said that the infrastructure should come first as houses can be built faster than schools and sewers can be enlarged.

Isobel Darby (Gold Hill ward) said we needed a plan. Without it there would be anarchy. Developers were already using the draft Core Strategy as "emerging policy". The March 2010 version was better than the June 2009 one but it was still not good enough. Developers would use the numbers as upper limits. Let's be brave. Let's go for a land swap with the school.

David Meacock (Chalfont Common ward) criticised the Core Strategy. He said that it claimed to want not to change the District but doubled densities. It claimed to want sustainable development but Newlands Park was miles from anywhere and would not reduce traffic. It said option 3 was chosen because it had the least impact on existing housing, but that was not true of the Grange site.

All parties agreed that the problem lies with central government which is enforcing unwanted high densities. The government's standards for public consultation were deeply flawed.

CHANGES to bus services in Chiltern and South Bucks: Two bus services operating in the Chiltern and South Bucks area will be changing. The 305 and 353 will have revised routes and timetables. Service 305, which is contracted to Transport for Buckinghamshire will now be operated by Jason Tours. Journeys between Beaconsfield, the Chalfonts and Gerrards Cross are largely similar with some slight time changes. Apart from one return journey at peak times the 305 will no longer serve High Wycombe, but passengers wishing to travel between High Wycombe, Beaconsfield, the Chalfonts and Uxbridge can still catch Carousel

Buses' routes A30, A40 and 740, which operate up to every half hour.

Service 353 will be operated commercially by Arriva the Shires and will run hourly Monday to Fridays finishing at around 7pm. It will run between Slough, Gerrards Cross, the Chalfonts and Amersham. The bus will no longer call at Berkhamsted, but passengers who wish to travel between Berkhamsted, Chesham and Amersham can catch Arriva's Route 62 which is being extended to Berkhamsted hourly.

On both services concessionary fares pass holders will be able to use their cards as normal.

COUNTY is to release £2m from Buckinghamshire County Council reserves in response to the urgent and immediate need to repair potholes which have inevitably appeared all over the county following the recent snow and icy conditions.

County Leader, David Shakespeare, said:

"Exceptional times call for exceptional measures, and this is such a time, so I will be transferring £2 million from our reserves so we can get our roads fit for purpose as soon as possible.

"We are in a position to act quickly because we have been prudent in maintaining a good level of reserves, which we can call upon in times of need.

"These repairs must be carried out as a matter of urgency. The longer we wait, the worse potholes will become. It is imperative that we get these repairs underway as quickly as possible.

"Six extra highways maintenance gangs were drafted in earlier in January, bringing the total to 15 gangs out on the roads, repairing 25 -30 potholes a day - that's around 2000 potholes repaired per week across the county. This extra money will enable us to increase both the quantity and quality of these repairs."

The next course will be held during February half term. FAMILY is the focus with the launch of the new Buckinghamshire family information service. Belly dancing, basketball and the chance to learn a new skill will be part of the launch of the Buckinghamshire Family Information Service (FIS) at two free family fun days being held this weekend (Saturday 23 January) at Aylesbury and High Wycombe.

The FIS is a new service which will create a 'one stop shop' for information and advice on a wide range of activities, events and services available to families with children up to the age of 19 living in Buckinghamshire. Areas covered as part of the service include childcare, family leisure activities and things to do, as well as advice on disabilities, benefits, health, schools, colleges, work and volunteering.

The all-day events, being held at Friars Square, Aylesbury and Eden, High Wycombe, will feature interactive taster activities, performances and

demonstrations from some of the organisations registered with the FIS.

Information stalls will be present with Connexions, Thames Valley Police, Children's Centres, Youth Focus, the Library service, Buckinghamshire Fire & Rescue Service and Aylesbury & Amersham College among the participants. Rebecca Varatharajah, the overall winner of the Causeway Buckinghamshire Young People of the Year awards, along with some of the other finalists, will be attending the events. Rebecca is a sixth-form student who volunteers much of her spare time to help others at school and in her local community, as well as being an elected member of the UK Youth Parliament. Families attending the family fun days will receive an FIS card, which will entitle them to a 10% discount at some of the Aylesbury and High Wycombe town centre food and retail outlets for the whole of Saturday. The card is designed to be kept as an easy reference for contact details for the new service.

As well as the family fun days, a number of events are being held at schools and Children's Centres throughout the county. These include activities specially designed for babies and pre-school children at Chesham, Burnham and Buckingham Children's Centres; taster sessions for children on drama, crafts, martial arts and dance at selected primary schools and food tasting and information fairs tailored for young people at selected secondary schools.

The FIS was formerly the Children's Information Service and successfully provided advice and support to parents with younger children. The FIS has now expanded the scope of the information it holds to include guidance and information for young people of up to 19 years and their parents and carers. The FIS is accessible by phone, email, text and a new dedicated website, www.bucksfamilyinfo.org, which includes an online directory which can be searched by postcode, keyword or category.

FIGURES published in January on the achievements of pupils in Buckinghamshire in GCSE examinations and other equivalent qualifications at the end of Key Stage 4 (KS4) show that results have improved yet again for the year.

The latest Achievement and Attainment Tables published by the Department for Children, Schools and Families show that Buckinghamshire came top of all shire authorities in the country for GCSE or equivalent results, with 65.4% per cent of our pupils achieving five or more A* to C grades including English and mathematics, at the end of KS4 - an increase of 2% when compared with last year and 14.7% higher than this year's national average. Our results are also the highest when compared with those of similar councils

known as our statistical neighbours.

Eight schools in Buckinghamshire were identified as National Challenge schools in 2007. The majority of these schools have improved their performance further in 2009 and only two are still below the threshold of

30% of pupils gaining 5+ A*- C passes including English and mathematics. Six of our schools - Aylesbury High, Beaconsfield High, Dr Challoner's Grammar, Dr Challoner's High, Royal Latin and Wycombe High - achieved 100 per cent of their pupils gaining five or more grades A* to C including English and mathematics. A number of schools have been particularly successful in supporting their students to make good progress from entry compared to similar pupils (as measured by Key Stage 2-4 Contextual Value Added measure) and are in the top 25% of all schools nationally. These schools are: Dr Challoner's Grammar, Waddesdon Church of England, Alfriston, Stony Dean and Wendover House.

Furthermore, five of our schools achieved 100% of their pupils making expected progress in English from KS2 to KS4 (Aylesbury High, Beaconsfield High, Dr Challoner's High, Sir Henry Floyd Grammar and Sir William Borlase's Grammar) and a further two schools achieved 100% of their pupils making expected progress in mathematics (Aylesbury Grammar, Dr Challoner's Grammar).

Results in the post-16 attainment tables for Buckinghamshire schools and colleges are also considerably higher than the national averages. Both the average QCDA point score per exam entry and per candidate for GCE/VCE A/AS or equivalent examinations in 2009 were the highest when compared with those of similar councils known as our statistical neighbours and also when compared with other shire authorities.
