
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Chalfont St Peter Village Voice, February 2015

Fiona is a founder member of the Salisbury Sinfonia and, in addition to her leading involvement with several eminent music groups, has played with the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra and appeared on national television and radio. She returns frequently to All Saints and is pleased to be making music for us again this year in celebration of Dennis Franklin's legacy to All Saints vibrant musical tradition.

The concerts in April, May and July start at 3 pm and finish with a delicious afternoon tea. On 14th June, a BBQ lunch will be available from 12.30 pm and followed by the concert at 2 pm. COMMUNITY SAFETY GROUP & NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP

REPORT TO VILLAGE APPRAISAL (20.01.2015)

1 THE TWO GROUPS continue to meet bi-monthly, alternating so that NAG meets one month, Safety Group ('CSG') the next and so on. The CSG plays an increasing role in Neighbourhood Watch schemes. It must be recorded that restrictions placed by Thames valley Neighbourhood Watch on access to coordinator contact details are not helpful and are a hindrance to the task of annual monitoring. Tony King is also area coordinator and recently secured good coverage in the local newspaper

- **2 NAG** is now taking delivery of its long awaited community **Speedwatch** equipment funded by Chiltern DC and the TV Police community fund. This should be in use from early February subject to weather. It is intended to carry out at least weekly exercises of 2 hours + with the speedwatch device and to involve CSP NHW schemes and Residents Associations. The local Police Team has access to the equipment but otherwise it will remain in the village
- **3 Crime & Anti-social behaviour** (ASB) stats suggest the village remains a relatively safe place with a handful of burglaries/break-ins. It is thought the presence in the village of the local police team is a considerable help
- **4 NAG** has recently set up an extension group to take an overall look at the serious **parking issues** in the village. It is likely the remit will be widened to take in speeding and traffic flow issues as well as it soon became obvious that the three are interlinked and that isolating 'Parking' as issue was not realistic.

 The aim of this group is to look for **ways of managing parking and speeding** which do not necessarily involve spending large pots of money. Meeting with businesses, retail traders, and encouraging NHW and Resident

Assoc. scheme to get involved will be part of that. The CSG will use their experience of school parking surveys to meet with staff governors and PTA's where a school does not have an adequate scheme

5 Another CSG member (John Long) reports on Pubwatch which he continues to chair. Sadly a number of the licensees do not participate actively but at the same time numbers of those on the banned list have dwindled and there are ow no names on the provisional banned list.

6 CSG & NAG are working with the Road & Transport Group whose report will appear separately.

Report to VAG Steering Group 21 January 2015

Clearly, the river is flowing well and although the weather has been helpful, we believe our activities have helped maximise the potential. Working parties continue approximately every five weeks and, while turnouts have been down, goods progress has been quickly made each time, as we are now building on the work of previous years. The Group had a very enjoyable dinner at The Greyhound in December and other functions — newsletter, groundwater and invertebrate surveys, maintenance of website involvement in local fluvial and drainage matters — continues.

Our first outing in 2015 will be at the end of the month when we hope to be joined by Chalfont St Giles Youth Club.

VISITOR STRATEGY GROUP

Report to VAG Steering Group 21 January 2015

The main focus of the Group has continued to be the development of a re-launch of the Chalfont St Peter Visitor Guide. Slow but steady progress is being made with securing promises of money from potential advertisers to match grants already committed. Text and some artwork is being revised. Thought is also being given to development of a complementary "Visitor" section and links to the new Parish Council website and to seeking publication of articles in magazines targeting, for instance, walkers, cyclists, history buffs etc. The Group has also discussed the possibility of creating some themed events during the week of Feast Day involving coordinated displays and special offers from local businesses, societies and bodies such as churches. Little enthusiasm has been received for the Group's ideas regarding a "Visitor Centre"

Youth Centre

The CSP Youth Centre continues to maintain its popularity among local young people. Attendances remain encouraging and new young people are continuing to join. We have a great group of volunteers who are showing remarkable dedication and commitment.

The Sports Court fence has been adjusted to prevent footballs going over into neighbours' gardens. This had caused some tension with neighbours, but the matter has been mitigated. The court is regularly used outside of youth club nights and is a popular destination for young people outside of school hours. It is hired by two local football teams and a small income is generated for the maintenance of the court.

We continue to partner with Chalfont St Peter Parish Council to support the development of a skatepark/integrated play area on the location of the current one. Intensive interventions continue to feature in the work. There are many vulnerable young people in our village who need one-to-one work. This is very time consuming for volunteers but the rewards are remarkable.

We look to an exciting year of opportunities to make a difference in the lives of many young people and their families.

January 2015 – update on events for Change4Chalfont

Most of our recent changes and developments were set out in our review at the VAG AGM in August. Developments and events since then include:

- 1. Change4Chalfont is hosting a talk on ground source heat pumps. This will take place on 26 January in The Space, Gold Hill Baptist Church, from 8pm. Please see the poster attached and forward to your members!
- 2. We are working with Chiltern District Council to obtain consent to plant nut trees in Chalfont St Peter. We have presented to the Open Spaces Committee of the Parish Council about this too.
- 3. We have the loan of the heat sensitive camera once more. We have it till the end of February and would be happy to scan local houses to show householders where they are losing heat! If you or your members would be interested in having your houses scanned, please let us know.
- 4. We are hoping to arrange a family bike ride around Chalfont St Peter in April.

CSP Chamber of Commerce report for VAG Jan 2015

Our focus in 2014 was the village 'street decorations'. The Chamber of Commerce is responsible for the provision of them and they make the village centre such an attractive place to live, work and to shop. The hanging baskets, flags, Christmas lights and tree on the common are an integral part of Chalfont St Peter and beloved by all. A couple of years ago, we took back the responsibility for them. Traditionally the cost has been met through contributions from the village centre businesses, but times change and we embarked on a fundraising programme to keep them going and then extend and improve them.

We've been very successful, raising close to £10,000 by the year end, via grants, donations and fund raising events – including grants from CDC, CSP Parish and VAG for which we were very grateful. As a result, as I hope you will have noticed, Christmas lights appeared in St. Peter's Court last year, the first time in many years that the precinct had been part of the decorations. In 2015 baskets and flags will also appear there. We were also able to purchase new lights for the tree on the common.

The money was not all spent and our plan now is to update and modernise the lights along Market Place, and replace worn flags. Report to VAG Meeting, 21 January 2015

Two projects have been completed since the last meeting. Garden seats have been placed in the front area and were well used by our customers during the summer and autumn months. We are grateful to Councillor David Martin for arranging funding from the BCC

Leaders Fund for this project which was matched by funding and resources from the volunteers of the Community Library.

The second project completed is the replacement of the carpets in the public areas of the Library. This was completed over the weekend of 10/11 January by the local firm First FloorCarpets and we are very grateful to the company for the support they have given to our Community Library for this project. The major part of the funding was provided by a grant of £3000 from the Buckinghamshire Community Foundation and we are grateful to this organisation for their support.

Rather than send the old carpeting to landfill we are delighted that we have been able to donate this to the Chalfont St Peter Parish Council which will use the carpets to cover non-used allotments to prevent weed growth.

Our next project is to introduce a season of film shows in the Community Library for the coming Spring. Planning on this by our volunteers in underway and further details will bare-leased as they become available. The various other activities of the Community Library continue to thrive and feedback-from volunteers and customers indicates that the Community Library plays a vital role in the life of the village.

VOPAG REPORT for MEETING WED JAN 21.

THE Autumn and Winter period has seen VOPAG hold monthly meetings as in our new printed programme; we managed to get our 2015 programme out by November which has enabled us to generate more interest in our activities. This is the first time we have published a 6 month forward programme and the innovation has been welcomed; all print work is done locally. Our Christmas meeting was very successful. Cllr. Isobel Darby came along and supported us all .We were yet again entertained by the Children from the Academy. A truly wonderful local asset. All our Members believe that the denial of the Grange site to the Academy by housing development is a great shame. Our monthly lunches at the Village Hall are still very popular with a regular attendance 25-30 each month.

Our **2015** programme was published shortly before Christmas; this reflects greater emphasis on excursions which are proving popular. An important impact will hopefully be our policy of **only accepting bookings at our meetings.** We hope this will increase our attendance levels.

Our priorities are unchanged reflecting our members concerns about both transport and the local NHS. Sadly there has been no progress on either front; the bus service issue to HW Hospital still remains; despite surveys by Healthwatch on hospital transport we have heard nothing; Concern about our local NHS service remains. A recent study of primary care at 2 Surgeries in the Village revealed that some **12000** patients are registered at the Misbourne surgery and **18100** at the two Calcot centre practices. Whilst satisfaction levels are high the facilities and space provided is poor. We believe the Hospital should play a greater role in primary Healthcare for **all** these 30000 patients..

Financially we are well funded at the moment; however we face running costs of **approximately £1700 p.a** and will be seeking further assistance in due course.

The group is run by a small Committee of 5. Our AGM [Very brief..is held at the April meeting.] Our website is still sadly under-utilised ...we are at VOPAG on Google...first page!

Membership of the Bucks 50 = Forum continues and we will work towards extending our Links with the other Bucks OPAGs in the year ahead.
