THIS is an appeal to all proprietors of newsagents, takeaways and, anyone who does paper based door-to-door deliveries.

Please, when you are delivering flyers, newspapers and similar ensure that you push them all the way through the letter box. Do not leave them hanging half way out. If the occupants are away, later on in the day when the majority of people have taken their papers inside, those left hanging out are a clear indication to burglars which homes may be unoccupied.

The Police have recently had complaints about this from members of the public. Yesterday along a street that has seen seven homes burgled within the last fifteen months someone left copies of a free newspaper hanging out from every letter box in the street.

Please pass this on to anyone you know who is involved in paper rounds and leaflet distribution.

Newsboys and Newgirls often do paper rounds quite early so here is a 10 point safety guide for you.

1. Do not talk to strangers, especially if they are in a car.
2. If you are being followed immediately head for the nearest place of safety.
3. Report any suspicious behaviour to your parents and the police at the earliest opportunity.
4. Avoid lonely areas. Beware of using short cuts such as alleys and bridges.
5. Be particularly vigilant when delivering in blocks of flats.
6. Never accept invitations to go inside a house for a cup of tea etc.
7. Carry a personal safety alarm.
8. If using a bicycle ensure that both the front and rear lights are working.
9. Wear reflective clothing in the dark and always wear a cycle helmet.

Returning lost people with memory problems home

Do a good turn for your neighbour. That's the aim of the new Neighbourhood Return scheme, which aims to act quickly to find people with memory problems, such as dementia, who have got lost. In England and Wales disorientation and 'getting lost' happens to some 40,000 people for the first time each year. It increases the likelihood of care home admission fourfold. This in turn increases the stress on sufferers and carers, and can impact heavily on personal and public finances. We want to extend care and independent, but supported living in the community to these vulnerable people.

Neighbourhood Return builds on the community messaging systems of Neighbourhood & Home Watch. It uses secure registration, messaging and mapping systems and its searches are risk assessed and managed by a specialist Local Authority call centre. The scheme is now being run across Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Berkshire, Northamptonshire and Waltham Forest, and went 'live' in November 2012.

Can you help us? We are looking for volunteers to join searches in their immediate area, who have a mobile phone which is regularly charged and has credit on it, and who can use text messaging.

We know everyone isn't available all the time, so the scheme aims to sign up as many volunteers across Buckinghamshire as possible. Even if you work, or if you have limited time available please still consider volunteering. If you aren't available or in the area when we alert you that someone has gone missing, just text back 'no'.

If you are free to help, our care centre will send you a description of the person and let you know where to search. When you reach the destination, you let them know and they will provide further instructions on where to look next. A safe searching guide helps to give you guidance about searching and how to gently approach the person who is lost, should you find them. Searches are conducted for up to two-and-a-half hours by volunteers, who can join or leave the search at any point during this time, if the person isn't found by then the search is then handed over to the police.

You can sign up to the scheme at www.ourturn.org.uk or by phoning **0116 229 3118**. This isn't a huge commitment. You will rarely or may never be called to help, but by registering, not only will you help carers to feel supported by their local community, but should someone in your local area go missing you could help save a life.

If you are a carer of someone with memory problems, you can register them using the contacts above. It's absolutely free. Once your loved one is registered, we will send you a fridge magnet with the helpline number on, so you can easily find it, should you ever need it. If you pre-register someone with memory problems, we can get volunteers mobilised in 3-5 minutes. You can still use the scheme in an emergency without pre-registration, it just takes 15-20 minutes to get all the details we need to start the search. The call centre keeps in touch with both the carer and Thames Valley Police at regular intervals to let them know how the search is progressing.

School crossing patrollers from across Buckinghamshire took time off on Tuesday and Wednesday (June 25, 26) to celebrate the diamond anniversary at two special receptions - one in the north and one in the south of the county.

Thanking the county's 70 patrollers for their commitment and care for children crossing busy roads to and from school,

Buckinghamshire County Council Chairman Carl Etholen said: "You work in all weathers, you show such dedication, and you provide such a valuable service. You deserve great recognition: long may you continue."

Cabinet Member for Planning and Transport, Janet Blake, said: "It is great to see the good work being carried out by school crossing patrollers. Their valuable contribution to the safety of children travelling to and from school is much appreciated and we hope to encourage more people to become crossing patrollers."

Lollipop patrollers were presented with commemorative badges and certificates.

A NEW online directory for care and community services launched.

People can now find details of care, community services and organisations at their fingertips, following the launch of a new online directory by Buckinghamshire County Council.

Bucks Connect, (www.bucksconnect.org.uk) is an online database designed to make life easier for residents to find essential information on a range of organisations from the private, public, community and voluntary sectors. The website, will help put them in touch with services from arranging social care support for adults, to finding a new community group to join.

Information can be found on extra help in the home, voluntary and community groups, charities and organisations that provide advice on topics such as advocacy, transport and money matters. There are also listings for various interest groups, community facilities and activities to take part in.

Patricia Birchley, Buckinghamshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing, said: "This is an excellent resource for families and individuals who rely on the support of community and care organisations. The website is a really simple way to find services that can help people be more active, find a new hobby, join a club, find a support group, cope with a long term condition or get extra help in the home...."

AN initiative that is saving millions of pounds for taxpayers has earned IT staff at County Hall runner-up place in a prestigious national competition.

Buckinghamshire County Council beat an impressive field of candidates to finish joint second in the partnership category of the Real IT Awards, held in central London on Tuesday night (June 18).

The award recognises the way the Council worked with partner organisations to share a public service network (PSN) across more than 400 buildings in the county.

The accolade follows an 18-month project which has led to an estimated £12 million savings - £1m per year for the next nine years, plus a further £3m otherwise needed in the next five years to update computer systems.

The authority's IT team merged the county's systems into one network with Wycombe, Chiltern, South Bucks and Aylesbury Vale district councils, as well as academies, schools and Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes Fire and Rescue.

The estimated £12m savings will be made across all the authorities who are now linked into the PSN. The network provides internet services to the majority of schools, libraries, adult learning centres and council offices in the county.

The County Council, joint runner-up with the Co-operative Banking Group, was pipped at the winner's post by SThree – an international specialist recruitment business with 67 offices in 20 countries.

Peter Hardy, Buckinghamshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Finance and Resources, who was at the awards ceremony, said: "We were thrilled to be recognised in this way. Of course, we would have preferred to win but we beat several other very worthy projects, and it was clear the judges were impressed by our entry.

"This is a tribute to the hard work and dedication of our IT staff who have saved the public a massive amount of money thanks to this initiative. It is also a tribute to the work of our partners who worked so hard to make this happen for everyone."

The Council's triumph was listed in the Real IT Awards booklet which read: "An outstanding feature of the Partnership between the council and their stakeholders (Schools, District Councils, Fire and Rescue Services) was the balance struck in protecting the needs of the smaller stakeholders, and the risks being taken by the council.

"As a result of the Framework Agreement there have been major cost savings for both Bucks CC and their Stakeholders.

"Expensive procurement processes have been eliminated and services improved."

Fourteen men, one lady and 1000 miles for FamilyLife UK A team of 10 Dads, four sons and one intrepid Mum from the Gerrards Cross area are riding from Lands End to John O'Groats to raise funds for FamilyLife UK, a charity that supports family life and relationships. The team has been in training for several months and will ride up to around 100 miles a day every day over two weeks from 14th to 28th July to achieve their goal of raising over £30000 for FamilyLife UK.

Mark Daniel, Director of FamilyLife UK says, "This is a challenging event and we have been cycling for several months to prepare. For those who like statistics: over the last 49 training rides we've cycled over 1,500 miles, climbed 91,000 feet (three times Mount Everest) and burned 82,000 calories in the process! I have been really moved by the commitment of each member of the team, many of whom have extremely busy jobs and lives. With the increasing pressures of 21st century life we've all seen relationships where the 'wheels have come off'. FamilyLife works to help people invest in and strengthen their relationships and its brilliant that the team want to do something extraordinary to support this."

The cycling team comprises 15 individuals from all walks of life. The youngest team member, at 16 years old, is Daniel Green, who will have just finished his GCSEs when taking up the ride. He is joined by his Dad, Graham Green, a carpenter. Other team members include a former bomb disposal officer, a man who plays rugby in his head and an adventurer who climbed the highest mountain in Mongolia on skis and nearly fell down a crevice on the way down. The 'veteran' team member is Geoff Enoch, a classic car engineer, who says that he's 40 trapped in the body of a 62 year old! The lady joining the team is Amanda Bourdillon, 48, from Italy, who is only joining the ride for the first quarter, due to family commitments.

The support team will be headed up by Christine Daniel, co-director of FamilyLife UK. It will follow the riders in two sponsored vehicles, carrying the luggage, back-up equipment, food and drinks. Overnight stays have been planned in youth hostels and bed and breakfast accommodation across the country.

Sponsorship has been generously given by 15 diverse local companies including The Entertainer, BP Collins Solicitors, Fisher Butchers, Gaviots Oak Carpentry and Joinery Services, WH Carden Ltd, Prontaprint Slough, County Financial, Northfields, Romis and JoelEnoch.com They are also supported by a number of specialist companies involved with the cycling world including Gore Bike wear, Dees Cycles, Stowes Cycles, Quest, Endura and Getbuzzing. VOLUNTEERS in Buckinghamshire will find a strong advocate in new County Council Chairman Carl Etholen. He has made them one of his top priorities for his year of office.

Carl, who received the chain of office from outgoing Chairman Marion Clayton at last month's annual council meeting, says that as government funding to local authorities reduces, the voluntary sector will become more and more valued as part of community life.

'Whether it's delivering library books to housebound people, serving on a school governing body, or helping conservation work in our country parks, volunteers do a fantastic job in helping to keep the county's wheels turning.'

Carl, who lives in Saunderton, is no stranger to voluntary work. He is a volunteer driver on Princes Risborough's Community Bus, and has volunteered to serve in Lacey Green's community shop.

He is also Chairman of Trustees for Princes Centre - the Princes Risborough Day Care Centre - and wrote a business plan on behalf of the community to take on the running of the centre from the County Council last year. Last month the centre celebrated its first year as a social enterprise.

Carl's aspiration is to pass on what he has learned from his experience to help and encourage those in the voluntary sector, connecting them with points of influence in the community.

'I want to help volunteers to see the benefits of helping locally, and the enormous contribution they make to the life of their communities.'

Carl says it is important to value what the voluntary sector can bring to protecting and enhancing Buckinghamshire's rural environment - another priority for the new Chairman.

He points to the concept of the community shop as a valuable sustainable service where a commercial concern is unviable. 'There's scope for opportunities beyond selling produce,' he says. 'It can become a community hub for people to meet, and promotes healthy lifestyles by encouraging people out of their homes to get their essential supplies.'

Not unlike the concept of the community bus, says Carl. 'This can greatly improve life in rural communities where commercial services aren't viable: a lifeline for local people, and also a wonderful social meeting point!

'We have a lady who travels on the Risborough bus but doesn't get off anywhere. She uses it to meet people and chat!'

Fresh from presenting Enterprise Awards at a Buckinghamshire Ambassadors' reception, Carl said that a priority during his year would be to encourage business and industry in their pursuit of excellence - and to shout about it.

'We are the entrepreneurial heart of England, and we see more business starts than anywhere else in the country,' he said. 'I want to encourage our sense of business pride to rise further, and the fact we had 60 Enterprise Award entries this year tells me we're moving in the right direction.'

Carl will continue to develop the role of Armed Forces Champion forged by Marion Clayton. 'Marion is a very difficult act to follow,' said Carl. 'As a superb Chairman, she raised the standard, representing the County at many different events with dignity, energy and great presence. I will try very hard to match this.'
